

Cowlitz County CASA is a powerful voice, advocating for the best interest of abused and neglected children in the dependency court system in our community.

COMMUNITY IMPACT:

We recruit, support, equip, and encourage volunteer Court Appointed Special Advocates to advocate for children in the dependency system. Volunteers help speak up for the best interests of each child to ensure they reach a stable, loving, and permanent home as quickly as possible. We are located at 1024 Broadway Street in Longview.

Cowlitz County CASA serves every child in the dependency system. We have served nearly 400 children already this year. We currently have 41 active volunteers serving our children. Staff cover the rest of our cases. Ideally, we would like 75 volunteers to ensure our children get more one-on-one support. CASA volunteer hours vary, but after the initial training, most spend 5-6 hours per month on each case.

Legal aid began in 2008 with the goals of local lawyers and members of the community. Our agency improves family lives and their financial situations. Our community is impacted by legal aid with thousands of donated lawyer time each year. A recent client of ours attended the drop in clinic at the hall of justice many times to see the Pro Bono attorneys over the course of several of months. The client was able to successfully win a case against the state of Washington modifying his support payment from over 1K a month to 50\$. He had significant health issues that kept him from doing the kind of work he always had done. This allowed him to better support himself and his family.

During 2018 we served 1004 survivors of domestic violence, 583 survivors of sexual abuse/assault and 322 survivors of general crimes like vulnerable adult abuse, assault, hate crimes, theft, etc.


